The Growing Greener Cities Symposium and the Office of the Provost's Global Forum are honored to bring Wangari Maathai, 2004 Nobel Peace Prize Winner and founder of Kenya's Green Belt Movement, to the University of Pennsylvania. In 2004, Dr. Maathai was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for her "contribution to sustainable development, democracy, and peace," stemming from her work on community empowerment and environmental conservation. She is the first African woman to receive this prestigious award. With a historic and visionary message, Dr. Maathai challenges audiences to rethink the concepts of peace and security. Recognizing the strong implications of sustainable management of the environment, she presents an argument for democracy rooted in respect for human rights, equity, and justice.
