#### **Course Description and Objectives:**

Spanish 130 is a first-semester intermediate-level language course that emphasizes the development of the four basic skills (reading, writing, listening, and speaking) within a culturally based context. Class time will focus on communicative activities that combine grammatical concepts, relevant vocabulary, and cultural themes. Students will participate in pair, small group and whole-class activities to practice linguistic skills in meaningful contexts. Major course goals include: the acquisition of intermediate-level vocabulary, the controlled use of the past tense, and the development of writing skills at a paragraph level with transitions. **The class will be conducted entirely in Spanish.** 

#### **Prerequisites and placement:**

In order to enroll in Spanish 130, you must have fulfilled one of the following prerequisites:

- Successful completion of Spanish 112, 120, 121 or 125;
- A score between 450 and 540 on the SAT II or the written departmental exam;
- A score between 384 and 453 on the online placement examination.

Students having completed a previous course in Spanish at Penn are not allowed to skip a level. Students in the College with a placement score are allowed to move up one level without seeking special permission; students in other schools who wish to move up a level must speak with the course coordinator.

Scores based on exams using a multiple-choice format do not test oral and listening skills and they provide us with a preliminary placement level. If necessary, students will be moved up or down a level if their ability to function in the language does not seem appropriate for the level of the course. You should consult your instructor or the course coordinator if you have concerns about your placement. #### Attendance:

Given the emphasis that must be placed on participation and interaction in foreign language courses, students are required to attend all classes. Following departmental policy, you are allowed **a maximum of 4 absences** during the semester, which you should reserve for short illnesses and emergencies. Your instructor will notify you after two absences and send a Courses-in-Touch warning notice to your school office after three absences. With your fifth absence, your final grade for the course will be lowered by one sign (e.g., a grade of A- will be lowered to a B+). For each subsequent absence, your final grade will be lowered an additional sign. You are expected to come to class on time; repeated tardiness will be counted towards an absence. You are responsible for all material and work covered on days that you are absent.

## **Class Participation and Homework:**

There will be 3 participation grades during the semester. The participation grade is based on the student's ability and willingness to demonstrate that he or she has studied and learned the vocabulary and grammar assigned and that he or she has read and reflected upon the readings. Equally important is the student's active engagement in class activities and discussions. Since consistent quality preparation is essential for success as a Spanish student, homework will be considered part of the student's daily grade for class participation. Students will be assigned specific homework to prepare for each class meeting and all textbook assignments should be prepared in writing unless the instructor indicates otherwise. Students should plan on devoting 2 hours per day of class to this course. **No late assignments will be accepted.** 

PLEASE NOTE: Cell phones, iPods and PDAs are not conducive to a good learning environment in the foreign language classroom. The use of these devices will not be permitted.

## Workbook (AM):

Students must complete the assigned homework from the *Activities Manual* listed in the **Calendario del Curso**. All *Activities Manual* exercises **must be completed online by the day students are being tested on that lesson**. Completion of the AM assigned homework is crucial since it is part of the student's class preparation.

## **In-Class Writing Activities and Composition:**

Students will write one composition in class. Following instructor's feedback, students will rewrite the composition and **turn in a typed final version** (double-spaced, 12 point font) **along with the draft**. Each version will constitute 50% of the grade. The composition is worth 10% of the final course grade. Students will also complete 3 short in-class writing activities that will be assigned by the teacher. These will not be rewritten and will also constitute 10% of the final course grade.

## Exams, Quizzes and Oral Exam:

There will be 3 short quizzes and 3 exams during the semester. An oral exam will be administered during the last 2 weeks of the semester. There will be no make-ups and there will be no exceptions to this rule. If you miss a quiz, an exam or an oral exam, you will receive a 0.
