To the Virginian Voyage. First printed 1606. The Sarah Constant, the Godspeed, and the Discovery sailed for Virginia in December. D. was well up to date with his Ode, for his book was entered 19 April 1606, only thirteen days after the patent for the expedition had been sealed. D.'s friend Chapman had celebrated Raleigh's voyage to Guiana in 1596 with De Guiana, Carmen Epicum. D. shows that he knew his Hakluyt well, as we should expect. Cf. Poly-Olbion, 19.
